Let's Play





Play time provides a great opportunity for children to learn new words. You can help your child learn and have fun during play with these ideas.

Be face-to-face

Be on the same level as your child, so sit if they are sitting, or sit on a chair if they are standing so your faces are at the same level.

Let your child lead the play

Follow what your child wants to do in play. It's okay if they want to play a game or use a toy differently to the way it's meant to be done. Playing the way your child wants will keep them interested for longer and give them time to learn new things.

Talk about what is happening

Talk about what your child is doing and what you are doing. "Your car is going up the ramp. My car is coming down".

Name objects

Name toys, pictures and actions during play, for example "here's dolly's bed", "teddy's drinking" or "build the tower".

Use more comments than questions

For example "That's a tall tower!" rather than "What are you building?"

Repeat new words

Repeat new words a few times to help your child learn. "Pour the sand. Pour, pour pour".

Add a word or two to what your child says

Add a word or two to what your child says, for example if your child says "teddy" you can say "teddy's sleeping" or "teddy's eating! Yum, yum!".
